The weekend kicked off with a welcome reception in honor of Omicron's 100th. Supreme Councilors had the opportunity to meet Omicron alumni spanning decades as they shared stories about their days as an undergraduate. Several current undergraduates from Omicron were also in attendance to meet the leaders of our Fraternity along with Omicron alumni.

The Supreme Council meeting began on Friday, April 8. The agenda was packed with a diverse range of topics including ZBTs recruitment standard for chapters and colonies, three charter applications, approval of the 2011-2012 operating budget, an update on the strategic plan, an overview of the newly revised brotherhood program experience titled "The Journey", and much more. Councilors participated in lively discussion and made several decisions that will continue pushing our organization forward. Undergraduates from the Omicron chapter participated in all sessions of the meeting and learned a great deal about how the international Fraternity functions.

The meeting culminated with the 100th anniversary banquet for Omicron Chapter. Close to 100 alumni gathered at the alumni building for this event. ZBT looks forward to another 100 years at Syracuse University.

A Strategic Plan Update for ZBT

"It's great to be a ZBT" is a term often heard within our organization. There may never have been a better time to say that famous line than now. As we look toward wrapping up the first year of ZBT's strategic plan, we want to take this opportunity to look at some important trends within the organization:

- ZBT projects that we will initiate 50% more men at the completion of this academic term than we did in 2001-2002.
- The average size of ZBT chapters has risen by 27% in the last eight years.
- ZBT has opened 68 new colonies in the last decade.
- Because of this growth, ZBT's international headquarters in Indianapolis has more than doubled its staff size in the last five years which provides valuable resources to undergraduates and alumni.
- Chapters and colonies continue to raise in excess of \$250,000 per year for worthwhile charities including ZBT's two adopted philanthropies, Children's Miracle Network Hospitals and the Maccabi World Union.

These are just a few of the many reasons why it is truly great to be a ZBT today and into the future. The Fraternity's strategic plan revolves around three areas: internal growth (recruitment), external growth (expansion) and retention of our members. We can't have success in just one without it influencing the other areas. Because of this the professional staff in Indianapolis is hard at work in aligning all resources and priorities to match the goals of the plan.

We are pleased to review some of the major tactics implemented during the 2010-2011 academic year:

Recruitment

- ZBT hired a Director of Colony Development and Recruitment. This staff
 member is responsible for working with all new colonies in their quest to
 become chartered chapters along with those groups that are underperforming in
 recruitment
- A more formal training program has been established to assist our groups in understanding rolling recruitment and how to effectively plan and execute multiple initiations per academic term.
- A monthly webinar series was developed to focus on various aspects of recruitment to help in training recruitment chairmen and other chapter leaders.
- A revised plan was developed and executed to assist those chapters currently initiating less than ten men per year.

Retention

 "The Journey" brotherhood experience was introduced to all chapters and colonies.

- A series of training webinars took place in the first month of the academic year training the Brotherhood Development Directors and Provosts on how to properly implement this program.
- A staff member was dedicated to ongoing assessment of "The Journey."
- New resources were introduced to chapter and colony leaders focusing on brotherhood education, brotherhood bonding, ZBT general educational training, the Big Brother program, and much more.
- Ongoing assessment has begun placing a focus on the brotherhood experience and reasons for early departure.
- A new national committee was formed and charged with evaluating the undergraduate experience to provide recommendations to professional staff and the Supreme Council moving forward.

Expansion

- ZBT entered into an agreement with Phired Up Productions to assist in expansion efforts on select campuses. This marks the first time in recent history that ZBT has partnered with an outside organization to enhance our expansion and colony development efforts.
- ZBT's professional staff streamlined the method of working with current undergraduates to identify their friends or acquaintances on other campuses that may be interested in starting a new chapter.
- The Fraternity partnered with ZBT alumni in various areas to assist in starting a new chapter on the campus they currently attend for graduate school. - The professional staff was re-structured to allow select consultants to focus only on expansion while other staff focused on current chapter servicing.

These are just a few of the many initiatives introduced this year to ensure a successful first year of the strategic plan. As we look into the next year, the Fraternity will focus on:

- 100% staff alignment with the goals of the strategic plan
- A stronger focus on best practices within the fraternity/sorority industry
- Leading with our product and what we offer to students, the community, and partners
- Creating consistency in our brand, message, and all communications
- Defining what it means to be a true "Powerhouse of Excellence"

Will a ZBT be in the White House?

Have you ever imagined the life of a politician? Do you find yourself intrigued with the world of politics? As a child did you have dreams of one day becoming the President of the United States? If so, Fred S. Karger, Iota (University of Denver) '72 can relate. Brother Karger joined the Iota Chapter of Phi Sigma Delta at the University of Denver in 1968. Soon after, the merger of Zeta Beta Tau and Phi Sigma Delta took place and he would spend his final years in college as a member of ZBT. During this time period Brother Karger was an active brother who



saw ZBT as an opportunity to hone his personal strengths. Being gay, it was a difficult time for him, but he used the opportunities available while in college to lay the ground work for the many successes that he would celebrate later in life. "The experience was a good foundation and although it was a tough time for me, the Fraternity was a safe haven." It was during his college days that he began to realize his ultimate passion, politics.

Since Fred was a child, politics have always been a part of his life. As precinct chairman, Fred's father brought the world of politics to the household. Brother Karger spent his early years travelling with his brother and father to the train station to hand out flyers during election time. This introduction into politics laid the seed for what Brother Karger's life would become.

Brother Karger's experience with ZBT would further prepare him for the many accomplishments in his future. The Iota Chapter prioritized philanthropic work and Brother Karger began to sharpen his ability to service those around him in need. "I learned from my ZBT experience the importance of servicing others and it laid the groundwork for many future endeavors." Fred had an opportunity to take part in a hands-on approach to tutor and mentor kids in the community. "ZBT at the University of Denver was an impressionable time for me and it became an important aspect of my life to give back to those in need."

Fred would graduate college in 1972 and quickly moved back to the suburbs of Chicago. He soon became enthralled in the election campaign for Charles Percy. As the youth co-director, Brother Karger had found his first full-time political job. Soon after, Fred would move to California and, after a short acting career, would find his next big opportunity in politics.

In 1976, Brother Karger volunteered for the senate campaign of Robert Finch. Bill Roberts was the campaign director and a year later he would hire Fred to work for a political consulting group called The Dolphin Group. Fred would work there for 27 years and along the way would learn an incredible amount about campaigning, political structure, policy making, and governmental affairs. The political bug was something Brother Karger would never be able to escape.

When asked why Brother Karger got involved and stayed in politics, the level of enthusiasm and passion that he delivers his message with is unrivaled. "It is the excitement, the strategy that intrigues me about politics," Fred continues, "I love the people, I love learning about my opposition and I realized early on it is something I am good at." It was this level of excitement and commitment that has kept Fred doing what he loves for so long.

Although he retired in 2004 he did not end his commitment to political affairs. In the election of 2008, he played an intricate role in the campaign against proposition 8 which was a state constitutional amendment that, "only marriage between a man and a woman is valid or recognized in California." Brother Karger once again found himself enthralled in a political campaign. Utilizing his past experiences, Fred brought aggressiveness and insight that the opposition against proposition 8 lacked. Brother Karger left the campaign revitalized and more passionate than ever before.

Over the next two years, Brother Karger would investigate the support he could garner for a campaign to run for the President of the United States. In 2010, Fred had two goals; to prove that he was serious and to prove that he was a credible candidate. After visiting New Hampshire and Iowa a number of times, hosting a Washington Post reporter for three days, meeting with the Bureau Chief of the Guardian newspaper in the UK, being interviewed live by a CBS political correspondent, and winning a straw poll of potential presidential candidates at St. Anselm College in early April, it is a fair assumption that Brother Karger has been successful with both goals. On March 23, 2011, Fred Karger officially announced his candidacy for the President of the United States.

Brother Karger is a man of firsts. He is the first ZBT brother, first Republican Jew, and first openly gay man to run for President. His commitment and passion to make a positive impact on his community and the country is an inspiration. He has been a model brother and citizen. On behalf of the Zeta Beta Tau Fraternity, we congratulate Brother Karger for his unwavering commitment to his beliefs, his many accomplishments, and we look forward to hearing of his future endeavors.

Zeta Beta Tau Fraternity is honored to announce Brother Stephen P. Ehrlich, Esq., Iota (University of Denver) '70, has been named a recipient of the Award of Distinction from the North-American Interfraternity Conference.

The Alumni Award of Distinction recognizes the fraternity man who has given his time, talents, and service for the betterment of the fraternity.

"Steve Ehrlich has been the rock of ZBT Fraternity for the last 30 years. He has shared his passion for the fraternity with countless numbers of undergraduates and alumni volunteer brothers. Brother Ehrlich was initiated into the Iota Chapter of, then, Phi Sigma Delta Fraternity in 1966. Since his graduation, Brother Ehrlich has held more than 50 volunteer roles within ZBT. He has volunteered in various positions such as: International President, International Vice President (three terms), International Board Member (for more than a decade), and Chapter Advisor (for decades at various campuses).

"This honor is a long time in the making for Brother Ehrlich. I have never witnessed a volunteer as engaged as Steve in as many different areas as he has been involved with. His dedication, passion, and love for Zeta Beta Tau are an inspiration for everyone. I am so proud to call him my brother," said Executive Director Laurence A. Bolotin, Alpha Zeta (Florida) '01.

Groups that have worked with Brother Ehrlich on recruitment have increased their recruitment size year after year. UCLA – Being a Powerhouse of Excellence

How do you define a Powerhouse of Excellence? Is it based on members, programs, presence, or awards? Is it an intangible lofty goal for all groups to aspire to achieve? Is it a feeling you get when you shake the hand of a member in that chapter and you just know? In the case of the Alpha Rho Chapter at the University of California – Los Angeles, it is all of these characteristics coming together to provide the best fraternity experience possible to as many men as possible. The men of Alpha Rho have taken it upon themselves to create an environment where excellence is expected of all Brothers. From academics to athletics, service to social, recruitment to recognition, the Chapter is demonstrating how to define itself through its actions.



One of the most tangible ways to identify a strong chapter is through its membership. Alpha Rho currently has over 100 men, making it one of the largest ZBT chapters in the country. A major part of that membership is represented in the men who joined this past fall and spring. Overall, the men initiated 53 new members through formal recruitment in the fall and spring quarters. This represents the best recruiting they've done over the course of an academic year on record, and thrusts them into the lead for most initiates of all ZBT chapters this academic year.

People join people and they develop relationships through the sharing of common experiences. Alpha Rho took these phrases and owned them, incorporating new members in all chapter programs while commanding a great presence on campus for potential members. When potential members see the excitement, enthusiasm, and pride demonstrated by ZBT men at UCLA, they simply want to be a part of that. What these individuals don't understand is that the brothers of Alpha Rho are living the Ritual of ZBT. The men have held fundraisers for ZBT's national philanthropies Children's Miracle Network Hospitals and Maccabi World Union, raising over \$6000 in addition to welcoming representatives of both organizations to the chapter house for presentations to the brothers.

Further, the men have contributed almost 1000 hours of community service this academic year, with over 500 alone taking place in the winter quarter.

All told, the chapter has demonstrated a commitment to excellence, and that has been evident nationally as well as locally. At the Greek Gala to honor top-performing chapters at UCLA, ZBT earned top marks in recruitment and new member education. In addition to these distinctions, the chapter confirmed their status as a top-tier fraternity on campus by earning the awards for most improved chapter and best fraternity at UCLA!

When all is said and done, the men of the Alpha Rho Chapter of ZBT will look back on this year as a guide for how to do things the right way. They've demonstrated what it means to be great and how to have a truly meaningful, well-rounded fraternity experience. At UCLA, ZBT demonstrates what it means to be a Powerhouse of Excellence.



ZBT Grants Honorary Membership to Outstanding Community Leaders

At the October meeting of the ZBT Supreme Council, a vote was unanimously passed to grant honorary membership to Sanford R. Cardin, president of the Charles and Lynn Schusterman Family Foundation, and Stephen M. Kuperberg, executive director of the Israel on Campus Coalition. Both men have accepted the honor and were initiated by the Phi Alpha Alpha Chapter of Zeta Beta Tau at the George Washington University.

"ZBT rarely grants honorary membership," said Executive Director Laurence A. Bolotin. "This is a special honor reserved for those men who truly embody the mission and values of the Fraternity in their daily lives."

Mr. Cardin currently serves as the president of the Charles and Lynn Schusterman Family Foundation (CLSFF), an organization that supports programs that ensure vibrant Jewish life by empowering young Jews to embrace the joy of Judaism, build inclusive Jewish communities, support the State of Israel and repair the world. The Foundation also supports non-sectarian charitable organizations dedicated to enhancing the quality of life in their hometown of Tulsa, Oklahoma. Mr. Cardin is a graduate of Harvard University and received his Juris Doctor from the University of Maryland School of Law.

"It is an honor to be inducted into the ranks of ZBT brothers dating back more than 100 years," says Mr. Cardin. "ZBT has been a key partner in our ongoing efforts to create a safe space for Israel on campus, and its

commitment to scholarship, leadership, diversity, and community service embody the highest values of the Jewish community."

The ICC is a partnership of the CLSFF and Hillel: The Foundation for Jewish Campus Life, in cooperation with a network of national organizations, including ZBT, committed to promoting Israel education and advocacy on campus. Mr. Kuperberg is a graduate of the University of Michigan where he earned both his undergraduate and Juris Doctor degrees.

"ZBT has been a valuable partner of the ICC since becoming a member and it is truly an honor to accept this opportunity to join the organization," says Mr. Kuperberg. "The work the Fraternity has done to incorporate all aspects of its mission and values on a daily basis is something I am excited to become a part of as an alumnus."

Undergraduates and alumni of Zeta Beta Tau have participated in numerous programs sponsored by

CLSFF and the ICC, including valuable leadership development and campus advocacy initiatives, and has served as a valuable resource for the National Fraternity. "ZBT is consistently impressed with the work of these organizations, much of which happens due to the important efforts of their staff leaders," said National President Ronald A. Pardo. "I'm proud to be able to call these men my brothers."

"We were thrilled to have the opportunity to initiate these two men into the Phi Alpha Alpha Chapter of Zeta Beta Tau," said □AA Immediate Past President Michael L. Siroka. "The impact that both organizations have locally, nationally, and internationally are tremendous and not surprising given the leadership of Sandy and Steve."

ZBT Rabbi Honored by Catholic Church

Rabbi Aaron B. Bisno, Alpha Xi (Washington University – St. Louis) '90 is the senior spiritual leader of congregation Rodef Shalom in Pittsburgh, PA. Rabbi Bisno recently received a distinguished award recognizing his leadership in interfaith relations due to his extraordinary work throughout Pittsburgh.

Rabbi Bisno was ordained in 1996. The Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati provided his education and training and is also where he earned his master's degree



in Hebrew Letters in 1995. Rabbi Bisno's additional education includes a bachelor's degree from Washington University in St. Louis, from which he graduated in 1990, and a master's degree in Organizational Dynamics, conferred by the University of Pennsylvania in 2004.

Prior to his arrival in Pittsburgh, Rabbi Bisno served as Associate Rabbi of Congregation Rodef Shalom (is the congregation name really the same in both Pittsburgh and Philadelphia?) in Philadelphia for six years. His career began shortly after his 1996 ordination when he became Executive Director of the Hillel Jewish Center at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville, a position he held until 1998.

Since arriving at Rodef Shalom, Rabbi Bisno has made a commitment to creating a communal and welcoming environment while also increasing interfaith relationships throughout Pittsburgh. He helped create the "Pursuer of Peace Pilgrimage" that took place from October 31 through November 8 of last year. Along with Bishop David A. Zubik, Rabbi Bisno accompanied Catholic and Jewish pilgrims to Rome and the Holy Land (do you want to specify actual location?). The purpose of the Pilgrimage was to move ever forward a local dialogue between the Church and the Jewish community, for which Rabbi Bisno has been a driving force.

In recognition for his interfaith leadership, Rabbi Bisno was awarded the Benemerenti Medal on Sunday, January 30, 2011. The Benemerenti Medal, translated means "to a well-deserving person," was instituted by the Holy See in 1832. At a time when the Church was facing extraordinary struggles in Europe, Pope Gregory XVI instituted this special papal award to honor friends of the Church who exhibited faithful service to their families and community, as well as exceptional service to the Church. Since 1925 this medal has been meant as a means to mark special recognition to those that have served the Church in their lives, no matter if they are lay or clergy, male or female, Catholic or non-Catholic.

The award was presented by Bishop David A. Zubik who accompanied Rabbi Bisno to Rome and Israel as a part of the "Pursuer of Peace Pilgrimage." In the program it was stated, "For his exceptional work in interfaith relations and the pursuit of peace, Pope Benedict XVI awarded Rabbi Aaron Benjamin Bisno the Benemerenti Medal." This was truly a great honor and was further

exemplified with the comment Bishop Zubik made. "It is deserved recognition of Rabbi Bisno for his dedication not only in his efforts in regard to Catholic-Jewish relations, but his dedication to peace and justice as a living part of our community. I have been honored to work with him, and honored to call him a friend."

Upon receiving the news that he would be receiving such a prestigious award, Rabbi Bisno displayed a sense of humility and gave further evidence that the award was well deserved. "I take it as a reflection of the work that has preceded me and the harmonious, healthy friendship and collegial relations and dialogue and understanding that is taking place between the Jewish and Catholic communities," he said. "I am continuing the work of my predecessors at Rodef Shalom and the work of other rabbinic colleagues in the community."



Largest Private Haggadot Collection

For Brother Stephen Durchslag, Alpha Kappa (University of Wisconsin) '62 a Sedar at his house is anything but ordinary. That's because the Chicago resident owns 4,500 Haggadot, making the choice of which to read from each year a bit difficult. Twenty-eight years ago, Brother Durchslag began his hobby of finding and collecting Haggadot and today it stands as the largest private collection in the world with Haggadot dating back to the 15th century. At first glance the books appear similar, but it's quickly realized that not only do they all tell the story of the Exodus of Jews from Egypt, but they also describe the time period they come from while also reflecting the historical relevance and the fact Haggadot have withstood the test of time.

Brother Durchslag attended Hebrew University for one year and graduate from Harvard Law in 1966. He practiced law in Chicago for the past 44 years and recently retired in January of this year. He began collecting Haggadot in 1982 when he bought his



first from a Jewish texts dealer in New York City. He quickly began to accumulate a large number of books and became fascinated with the story each one told.

Haggadot capture not only the story of Passover, but also the significance of the time period they are written in. Brother Durchslag's collection spans cultures and languages ranging from English and German to more exotic languages such as Judeo Arabic and Ladino (Hebrew and Spanish.) His collection reaches all corners of the world from Europe, Africa, North and South America to the former Soviet Union, Germany, and Israel.

One Haggadah, printed in Venice in 1545, includes commentary by famed commentator Don Isaac Abarbanel, with a derogatory statement about the King of Portugal fearfully inked out by Jewish censors. Another Haggadah, published by a community in Holland in 1941, includes scenes of their homes being destroyed by Germans, as well as pictures of places where they dreamed of living in Israel. Durchslag also has a Haggadah used in the Soviet Union during the 1970s that is bent in half because it was hidden deep inside someone's pocket to prevent detection. His oldest comes from Soncino, Italy, printed in 1485, which is the second-oldest printed Haggadah in the world.

His collection captures major moments in history exemplified by the Haggadot that were given to soldiers of both sides in WWI and units in WWII. Brother Durchslag's collection includes Haggadot given to members of a British Jewish unit in WWII, the American Army in Munich, and to members of the newly formed Israeli Army in 1948.

"Every community that existed published its own Haggadah," Durchslag explains. "It's like having, on your shelves, the whole Jewish experience since the late 1400s."

When speaking with brother Durchslag there is a sense of responsibility that exudes when

discussing his collection. When reminiscing about his own Sedars as a little boy he expresses a communal atmosphere that helped create the passion he has today towards Passover.

"Passover has always been a magic holiday to me, filled with family memories. It really hits deep in my soul. Brother Durchslag continues by saying, "the thing that moves me about the haggadot is that they were used by the community; everyone used them at the table and they represent a communal experience."



Brother Durchslag has shared his collection in exhibits at Northwestern and will soon offer it at the Regastin Museum at the University of Chicago. We thank Brother Durchslag for his willingness to share his story.





Distinguished Speaker Series







My book, *Triple Crown*, was recently published by Borromean Books. *Triple Crown* is the only triple heroic crown of sonnets in the English language. The highly structured and interwoven poems deal with three aspects of reality as seen through the lens of scripture: the universal, the societal, and the personal. The first cycle has a universal theme, the retelling of the story of Creation. The second cycle describes the conflicts of the kings of ancient Israel in the early days of its national existence. In the final cycle, Job describes his suffering, and rails against a world which appears to be devoid of justice.
